Introduction

Ordination is not just a special moment for the individual concerned but also for their family, friends and indeed the whole church. So we are very pleased to welcome you to St. Mary's Church today for this deeply significant service, recognizing that you represent others too who aren't able to be here.

THE DECLARATION OF ASSENT AND OATHS

Before the service the candidates will have made the Declaration of Assent and taken the Oaths of Allegiance and of Canonical Obedience.

The Declaration of Assent

Preface (spoken by the Bishop):

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Candidate: I, N, do so affirm and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

The Oath of Allegiance

I, N, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, her heirs and successors, according to law: So help me God.

The Oath of Canonical Obedience

I, N, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Bishop of Leicester and his successors, in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.

THE GATHERING

The Organist plays as the congregation gathers.

The Introduction

The Bishop welcomes the Congregation and introduces the Service.

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light. The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known. Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others.

The Presentation

The Ven Richard Worsfold, Archdeacon of Leicester and The Ven Claire Wood, Archdeacon of Loughborough, stand and present those to be ordained deacon to the Bishop.

Bishop Martyn, we present to be ordained to the office of deacon in the Church of God, N.

When the Ordinands have been presented, the Bishop asks the Diocesan Director of Ordinands and The Revd Dr Rob Hay, Parish Transition and Ministry Development Enabler,

Have those whose duty it is to know these Ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning?

They have.

Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry?

DDO/Rob Hay They do.

The Bishop turns to the Ordinands and says:

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

Ordinands I do so believe.

The Bishop continues

I invite The Archdeacon of Leicester to confirm that the Ordinands have taken the necessary Oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

Archdeacon

They have duly taken the Oath of Allegiance to the Sovereign and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

The Gospel Reading

Luke 24.13-35

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about lesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

THE LITURGY OF ORDINATION

The Declarations

The Ordinands stand and the Bishop of Leicester addresses the Congregation:

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world that the love of God may be made visible. Deacons share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They preach the word and bring the needs of the world before the Church in intercession. They accompany those searching for faith and bring them to baptism. They assist in administering the sacraments; they distribute communion and minister to the sick and housebound.

Deacons are to seek nourishment from the Scriptures; they are to study them with God's people that the whole Church may be equipped to live out the gospel in the world. They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us.

The Bishop addresses the Ordinands directly:

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Bishop Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary

for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands I do so accept them.

Bishop Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all

studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to

the truth of the gospel?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Do you believe the doctrine of the Christian faith as the Church of

England has received it, and in your ministry will you expound and

teach it?

Ordinands I believe it and will so do.

Bishop Will you strive to make the love of Christ known through word

and example, and have a particular care for those in need?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Will you be a faithful servant in the household of God, after the

example of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your

household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a

pattern and example to Christ's people?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake

of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Will you accept the discipline of this Church and give due respect

to those in authority?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Bishop Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up

the gift of God that is in you, to grow in holiness and grace?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The Congregation stands.

The Bishop addresses the whole people of God:

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these Ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations.

Is it now your will that they should be ordained? It is.

Will you continually pray for them? **We will.**

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry? We will.

The Bishop continues, addressing the Ordinands:

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust in which you are now to share: the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant.

Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be called to account.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened. Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The Prayers of the People

All remain seated. The Bishop introduces the Litany with these words:

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

The Revd Canon Karen Rooms, Sub-Dean of Leicester Cathedral and Diocesan Women's Ministry Enabler, leads the prayers for the Ordinands and for the ministry of the whole Church

For the peace of the whole world, for the welfare of the Holy Church of God, and for the unity of all, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For all the members of the Church in their vocation and ministry, that they may serve him in truth and love, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For all bishops, priests and deacons, that they may hunger for truth and thirst after righteousness, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For Mark, Matt, David, Kat, Sharon, Phillippa and Riffat, and for all those called to be deacons in his Church, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For the mission of the Church, that in faithful witness we may proclaim the gospel of reconciliation to the ends of the earth, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For the unity of the Church, that we may be one in Christ according to his will, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For those who are lost and for those who have strayed, that they may return to the way of Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For the sick and the suffering, for the aged and infirm, for the lonely and neglected, and for all who remember and care for them, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For the poor and the hungry, for the homeless and the oppressed, for all prisoners and captives, and for our brothers and sisters who are persecuted for their faith, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For Elizabeth our Queen, for the leaders of the nations and for all in authority, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

For ourselves;

for grace to repent and amend our lives that we may be pardoned and absolved from all our sins, let us pray to the Lord.

Lord, have mercy.

Remembering those who have gone before us in faith, and in communion with all the saints, we commit ourselves, one another, and our whole life to Christ our God;

To you, O Lord.

Lord, you are merciful and forgive our sins. You hear those who pray in the name of your Son. Grant that what we have asked in faith we may obtain according to your will; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The Ordination Prayer

The Bishop of Leicester stretches out his hands towards the Ordinands and says:

We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood, a universal Church. We praise and glorify you because you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a slave; he humbled himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross.

We praise and glorify you because in every age you send your Spirit to fill those whom you have chosen, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your name, to share as deacons in the ministry of the gospel of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

Each Ordinand comes to the Bishop in turn.

The Bishop lays his hands on the head of each Ordinand, saying:

Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant *N* for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

When the Bishop has laid hands on all of the Ordinands, the prayer continues:

Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to fulfil their ministry. Make them faithful to serve and constant in advancing your gospel in the world.

May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son, who washed the feet of his disciples, and set the needs of others before his own.

May their life be disciplined and holy, their words declare your love and their actions reveal your glory, that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you.

He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.

Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:

Drink this, all of you;

this is my blood of the new covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith: Christ has died: Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with [N and] all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
