There are some activities available to do in the pew and if at any time young ones become very restless and as parents/carers you feel the need to escape there is a small crèche room at the front left-hand side of the church where there are further toys and the service can be heard through a speaker.

Introduction

Ordination is not just a special moment for the individual concerned but also for their family, friends and indeed the whole church. So, we are very pleased to welcome you today for this deeply significant service, recognizing that you represent others too who aren't able to be here.

God's call comes to us in many different ways. Each person being ordained has their own story to tell about how God called them and how their response led to this moment. Some of you will have accompanied them on this journey of exploring God's call. Some of you may even sense within this service "the faintest echo of a whisper of the voice of the God" calling you. If so, please don't be afraid to speak to someone about this. Most of us start off thinking "God would never call me" but the truth is that God calls every one of us – some to ordination, some to lay ministry in the church, some to the ministry of healing, teaching, administration or service in the wider world. The important thing is not to ignore God's call because it truly is the path to fulfillment and purpose in life.

So we invite you to pray with us for those being ordained, and to commit yourself to go on praying for them and supporting them in their ministry. There are many challenges in today's world and we need ordained priests and deacons to both remind us that God is present and active in the world and also help us make sense of it all.

I would like to extend my personal thanks to Revd Vanessa Conant, Team Rector in the Walthamstow Team Ministry, who has led the ordination retreat this week which I know has been an inspiring experience for all those being ordained. I have also spent time with each of the ordinands during this week at Launde including the very moving experience of washing their feet, as we all seek to follow the example of our Lord and Saviour.

THE DECLARATION OF ASSENT AND OATHS

Before the service the candidates will have made the Declaration of Assent and taken the Oaths of Allegiance and of Canonical Obedience.

The Declaration of Assent

Preface (spoken by the Bishop):

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Candidate: I, *N*, do so affirm and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

The Oath of Allegiance

I, *N*, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors, according to law: So help me God.

The Oath of Canonical Obedience

I, *N*, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Bishop of Leicester and his successors, in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.

The Introduction

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light. The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known. Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others.

The Presentation

The Archdeacons stand, and The Venerable Richard Worsfold, Archdeacon of Leicester, presents those to be ordained deacon to the Bishop.

Bishop Saju, we present to be ordained to the office of deacon in the Church of God, N.

When the Ordinands have been presented, the Bishop asks The Revd Sue Willetts, Diocesan Director of Ordinands, and The Revd Dr Rob Hay, Head of Learning and Ministry Development

DDO/HLMD	Have those whose duty it is to know these Ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning? They have.
DDO/HLMD	Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry? They do.

The Bishop turns to the Ordinands and says

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

Ordinands I do so believe.

The Bishop continues

I invite and The Venerable Claire Wood, Archdeacon of Loughborough, to confirm that the Ordinands have taken the necessary Oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

Archdeacon They have duly taken the Oath of Allegiance to the Sovereign and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

The Collect

Let us pray for Cecilia, Bob, Dave, Linda, and Geoff, who are being ordained here today, and for the ministry of the whole people of God.

God our Father, Lord of all the world, through your Son you have called us into the fellowship of your universal Church: hear our prayer for your faithful people that in their vocation and ministry each may be an instrument of your love, and give to your servants now to be ordained the needful gifts of grace; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Psalm 139

A reading of Psalm 139.

O LORD, you have searched me and known me.

You know when I sit down and when I rise up;

you discern my thoughts from far away.

You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways. Even before a word is on my tongue, O LORD, you know it completely.

You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.

Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it. Where can I go from your spirit? Or where can I flee from your presence? If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there. If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast.

If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me,

and the light around me become night,"

even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day,

for darkness is as light to you.

For it was you who formed my inward parts;

you knit me together in my mother's womb.

I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

Wonderful are your works; that I know very well.

My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret,

intricately woven in the depths of the earth.

Your eyes beheld my unformed substance. In your book were written all the days that were formed for me, when none of them as yet existed.

I hate them with perfect hatred; I count them my enemies.


Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts. See if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

The Deacon reads

The Gospel Reading

Luke 15.11–32

The Lord be with you **and also with you**.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

Then Jesus said, 'There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, "Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me." So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant

country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, "How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands.' " So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son." But the father said to his slaves, "Quickly, bring out a robe-the best one-and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" And they began to celebrate.

'Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, "Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound." Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, "Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!" Then the father said to him, "Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

The Declarations

The Ordinands stand and the Bishop of Loughborough addresses the Congregation

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world that the love of God may be made visible. Deacons share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They preach the word and bring the needs of the world before the Church in intercession. They accompany those searching for faith and bring them to baptism. They assist in administering the sacraments; they distribute communion and minister to the sick and housebound.

Deacons are to seek nourishment from the Scriptures; they are to study them with God's people that the whole Church may be equipped to live out the gospel in the world. They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us.

The Bishop addresses the Ordinands directly

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Bishop	Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?
Ordinands	I do so accept them.
Bishop	Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the gospel?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Do you believe the doctrine of the Christian faith as the Church of England has received it, and in your ministry will you expound and teach it?
Ordinands	I believe it and will so do.
Bishop	Will you strive to make the love of Christ known through word and example, and have a particular care for those in need?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Will you be a faithful servant in the household of God, after the example of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Will you accept the discipline of this Church and give due respect to those in authority?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.
Bishop	Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to grow in holiness and grace?
Ordinands	By the help of God, I will.

All stand.

The Bishop addresses the whole people of God

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these Ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations.

Is it now your will that they should be ordained? It is.

Will you continually pray for them? We will.

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry? We will.

The Bishop continues, addressing the Ordinands

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust in which you are now to share: the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant.

Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be called to account.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened. Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The Litany

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

The Revd Canon Emma Davies, Canon Precentor, leads the prayers for the Ordinands and for the ministry of the whole Church.

After each petition please join in with the words **Lord have mercy**:



Let us pray to the Lord:

For the peace of the whole world, for the welfare of the Holy Church of God, and for the unity of all, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For all the members of the Church in their vocation and ministry, that they may serve him in truth and love, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For all bishops, priests and deacons, that they may hunger for truth and thirst after righteousness, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For Cecilia, Bob, Dave, Linda, and Geoff, and for all those called to be deacons in his Church, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy.** For the mission of the Church, that in faithful witness we may proclaim the gospel of reconciliation to the ends of the earth, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy.**

For the unity of the Church, that we may be one in Christ according to his will, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For those who are lost and for those who have strayed, that they may return to the way of Christ, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For the sick and the suffering, for the aged and infirm, for the lonely and neglected, and for all who remember and care for them, let us pray to the Lord.


Lord, have mercy.

Remembering those who have gone before us in faith, and in communion with all the saints, we commit ourselves, one another, and our whole life to Christ our God; **To you, O Lord.**

The Bishop concludes the Litany with the following Collect:

Lord, you are merciful and forgive our sins. You hear those who pray in the name of your Son. Grant that what we have asked in faith we may obtain according to your will; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Ordination Prayer

The Bishop of Loughborough stretches out his hands towards the Ordinands and says

We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood, a universal Church. We praise and glorify you because you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a slave; he humbled himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross. We praise and glorify you because in every age you send your Spirit to fill those whom you have chosen, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your name, to share as deacons in the ministry of the gospel of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

Each Ordinand comes to the Bishop in turn. The Bishop lays his hands on the head of each Ordinand, saying

Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant N for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

When the Bishop has laid hands on all of the Ordinands, the prayer continues

Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to fulfil their ministry. Make them faithful to serve and constant in advancing your gospel in the world. May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son, who washed the feet of his disciples, and set the needs of others before his own. May their life be disciplined and holy, their words declare your love and their actions reveal your glory, that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Giving of the Bible

The Bishop gives a copy of The New Testament to each of the newly ordained deacons, saying

N, receive this book.

This is a sign of the authority given you this day to speak God's word to his people. Build them up in his truth and serve them in his name.

The Training Incumbents place a stole over the left shoulder of each deacon.

The Welcome

The Revd Canon Karen Rooms, Acting Dean of Leicester, says to the new deacons

We preach not ourselves but Christ Jesus as Lord and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. We welcome you as fellow servants in the Gospel: may Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, that you may be rooted and grounded in love.

The Peace

Christ is our peace. If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation. The old order has passed away: behold, the new has come.

The peace of the Lord be always with you **and also with you.**

Deacon Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

All remain standing to sing the next hymn sung in Persian and English.

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.



Please go to the Communion station as directed by the stewards. If you would prefer a blessing, simply keep your head bowed. If you need to receive Communion in your seat please ask a steward and this will be arranged. **Gluten-free wafers** are available near the Bishop's station.
