




Bishops Children & Youth Council Listening Report

Introduction

How do we hear and respond to the voice of children and young people in the Diocese of Leicester?

To find some answers, we are experimenting with a termly process of youth-led agenda setting, listening, sense making and reporting.

The Process

A group of young people set agenda and design a listening resource to distribute to listening groups.

Listening groups are facilitated in schools and church groups, across a range of contexts. Children and young people are asked to share their thoughts, ideas, and stories, in response to a series of conversation prompts and interactive activities.


This term we are running our listening process in partnership with a national Church of England project board, chaired by Bishop Martyn. The project board want to understand what children and young people value in leaders.





Figure Out the Leader

Description: Write responses on a figure outline. **Question:** What qualities do you think are important in a leader?



"When discussing round one as we walked back to class, a child said, 'serving would have been good'. So, I let them write it down. They intentionally wrote it on the hand as they felt you needed hands to be able to serve" - Facilitator.



'Kind, loving, and caring are obvious answers to what a leader should be. They're normal traits' 'Top seven responses are character traits, except listening, which is a skill'

'The top responses all relate to relationship, or how leaders react to people their leading' 'The top responses are all qualities you'd look for in a friend'

When asked about what loving looks like in action... 'building good relationships with other people, by listening, communicating well and being inclusive'

Good sports leaders 'bring people together' and 'show you how to improve and get better'

KEY OBSERVATIONS:

- Most frequent responses are character traits (who I am), not skills (how I lead)
- Responses emphasise the importance of relationship
- Good leaders bring people together
- Good leaders use their skills to help others

'sportspeople are accessible and relatable... it's easy to aspire to be like them'

'it's sad that we often want to be like others rather than ourselves... such easy access to social media means you tend to compare the way you look and what you like to do with other people'

KEY OBSERVATIONS:

- Accessible. Importance of being easy to find (available) and open to others
- Relatable. Importance of having relevant role models to aspire to be like
- Time. Influenced by those you spend the most time with (online & IRL)
- Known. We all want to be seen and heard

'as you get older, you get more independent and gain access to more ideas about the world... through social media... it means you make up your own mind, rather than what teachers tell us'.

'If I didn't go to church, I'd probably speak to my school chaplain about faith'

'teachers (secondary) are there just for that one lesson and that's it'

> 'you only have one teacher in primary school... so you have a closer relationship with them'

'In high school you don't have them same relationship with teachers as in primary school... you need other adults you can trust... like youth workers'

'proximity is important to open up to people and ask questions'

KEY OBSERVATIONS:

- Children most likely to speak to parents, vicars & teachers about faith
- Young people most likely to speak with youth workers about faith, least likely to speak to teachers and siblings
- Shared time and space an important factor to build relationships of trust

How could the church make more time and space for children and young people to build trusting relationships with adults?

How could the church make more time and space for children and young people to build trusting relationships with adults?
