## Intercultural Ministry Enabler

Suzanne Hanson was appointed as the Intercultural Ministry Enabler to assist churches in the diocese to adopt a more intercultural ethos by helping churches journey towards becoming intercultural worshipping communities. She seeks to do this by raising awareness, equipping churches with the necessary intercultural skills and accompanying them. This project, led by Lusa Ngoy, is linked to the wider vision of promoting racial justice and tackling discrimination within the diocese. Suzanne's role on the Social Responsibility Panel is to enable the wider dissemination of this vision.

## Community Worker

Lois Davey oversees the Foodbank and the weekly Soup Kitchen while supporting members of these communities who join the church family at HTL. "Triangle" serves hot meals every Friday evening to the homeless and vulnerably housed, along with some food cupboard items and some bits of toiletries & clothing if they need. The emphasis is for them to find a sense of community and acceptance. For those that are not specifically homeless, they can also provide life skills training to include budgeting and basic cookery, along with a debt counselling service called Trinity Money Advice Leicester.

## Modern Slavery

Kat Gibson represents "Christians in Leicester & Leicestershire Against Modern Slavery" (CLLAMS) on the SR Panel. CLLAMS is a fairly new group that started meeting in Autumn 2020. They long to see modern day slavery eradicated from our communities. Coming from both Christian and professional backgrounds, they have 2 main aims. One, to engage with modern slavery charities, local organisations, representatives from retail and manufacturing and the police. Two, to increase awareness in our churches of the prevalence and ubiquity of modern slavery, enabling fellow Christians to both recognise instances of potential slavery, and giving them the confidence and information they need to report them.

## Financial Inclusion

Lots of us are acutely aware of the financial pressures on many households, where ends just don't meet, and the searing effect of poverty and deprivation. What are often less clear are the additional unseen obstacles and barriers - lack of digital access, not understanding how loans work, inability to access a bank account, and many other such issues. For some years a group called the Fair Finance Initiative has served the City and County. The Social Welfare Cell, chaired by Alison Adams, works to enable local groups to develop responses to some of these issues, including supporting people with debt advice, financial literacy, safe borrowing, budgeting.

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## Mothers Union/Family Life & Gender Based Violence

Ruth Fryer works as a midwife and has been an Mother's Union member for more than 20 years.

MU is a Global, women-led movement with over 4 million members worldwide and around 900 in Leicestershire. Our vision is of a world where God's love is shown through loving, respectful and flourishing relationships. Much of our work is in the area of supporting stable family life and the protection of children. MU has a strategic focus on countering gender injustice incorporating Violence Against Women & Girls in all forms (VAWG). MU campaigns have helped bring amendments to the Domestic Abuse bill currently going through UK parliament.

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## Environment Officer

Andrew Quigley is passionate about God's gifts in the wonders of the natural world, and how we show our love for Him and all people in how we take care of them. As Diocesan Environment Officer, Andrew convenes the Environment Group for the diocese. Together they have a wealth of ideas for how our worship, buildings and lives can better reflect our care for God's creation. In particular, helping churches work towards their Eco-church awards and the Diocese achieve Eco-Diocese status are our main focus. ## Together Leicester
